MUTUAL AID CARE PACKAGES for Newly Arrived Migrants in King County

What Support Is Available?

- Care packages with essential hygiene items *
- Accompaniment to immigration court and bond hearings
- Information on Know Your Rights with ICE, employers, health care, and more for immigrants
- Rapid Response for reports of immigration enforcement activity
- Referrals to legal orientation for detained persons and to an immigration bond fund for detained individuals
- Referrals to services such as civil legal aid, rent support, food, baby supplies, and local immigrant support networks
